The Host publishing house focuses primarily on high-quality original Czech prose and prose in translation, poetry, literary theory and educational works on literary subjects. The principal foci of its specialist publications include history, sociology, linguistics and auteurs of cinema. In the last few years it has greatly expanded its range of fiction in translation and crime fiction and thrillers from Scandinavia.

The roots and interests of Brno-based Host Publishers are linked with the **magazine** of the same name, which first appeared, in *samizdat*, in 1985. On the Czech book market Host now has the profile of a practically unique phenomenon. This is thanks to its well-established editorial series, authors whose names are among the most prestigious and successful in Czech literature and the Host monthly magazine, which reflects on and enriches the Czech literary scene.

Host has introduced to Czech readers the crime novels of Stieg Larsson, Lars Kepler, Jussi Adler-Olsen, Henning Mankell and Åsa Larsson, which have been quick to occupy the top of the sales charts. Books by Czech authors Kateřina Tučková, Petra Soukupová and Jan Balabán have also become bestsellers. And the poems of legend of the underground J. H. Krchovský continue to be a popular phenomenon. But Host can take pride in more than just its leading role in the sales charts. The content of its catalogue of publications is of remarkably high quality and includes many leading writers from abroad, including Pulitzer Prize winner Jeffrey Eugenides (USA), Daniel Glattauer (Austria), Carol Birch (UK), Olga Tokarczuk (Poland), Muriel Barbery (France), Willem Frederik Hermans (Netherlands) and Czech writers including Antonín Bajaja, Radka Denemarková, Jiří Hájíček, Jakuba Katalpa and Bianca Bellová. The many Czech poets who publish with Host include Petr Hruška and Radek Malý. Host provides opportunities for début authors, too, be they poets, prose writers or scholars of literature.

Since 2007 Host's 'court' graphic artist has been Martin Pecina, one of the Czech Republic's most distinctive and highly regarded typographers, making books from Host impossible to mistake. Host recently provided a home for the prestigious Czech Library / Česká knižnice series of high-quality editions of classic Czech works. Since 2009 Host has published annually a volume entitled The Best Czech Poetry / Nejlepší české básně. Host Publishers also holds regular literary events.

The Žítková Goddesses Žítkovské bohyně

A fascinating tale of the female soul, magic and a part of Czech history kept hidden.

High in the hills of the White Carpathians there lived women with extraordinary gifts, healers who from time immemorial had treated all kinds of affliction and coped with all kinds of difficulty; it was also said that they could see the future. Known as goddesses, they passed their arts from generation to generation. One of the last in the line of goddesses of Žítková, Dora Idesová has not learned these arts. In the late 1990s she visits the archives of the Ministry of the Interior in Pardubice, where she discovers a State Security Police file on an enemy of the state — the goddess Surmena, her aunt. Although Dora never became a goddess herself, as she unravels the life stories of the women of Žítková she is surprised to learn that she is an inseparable part of an arcane lore...



Fish Blood Rybí krev

The author continues his exploration of the Czech village that we last saw in the prizewinning *Rustic Baroque*.

We find ourselves in southern Bohemia as the 1980s give way to the 1990s. After fifteen years abroad Hana returns in 2008 to a half-flooded village on the banks of the Vltava. Here she grew up. Here she wished to marry and become a teacher at the one-class school. But everything turned out differently. Now she stands alone on the deserted village square. Hana has the courage to look back, to put questions to herself and those who once meant a great deal to her. People over forty wish to put their affairs in order, to draw a line under old issues and sources of pain — this is what Hana tells herself as she meets her father, brother and childhood friends after many years apart from them. ¶ The novel is first and foremost about the disintegration of a family and a village in a completely different set of social circumstances. The theme of the displacement and demolition of a community so that a nuclear power station can take its place is certainly a topical one that needs to be addressed at a time when the future of other villages is under threat - at any place in the world really.

But Fish Blood is not any old 'green novel'; above all it is an absorbing human story of three friends from a small village whom fate has scattered across the world. It is a story with strong echoes of longing for family cohesion, and it is about the power of love and forgiveness.



Have you ever wondered what a story written by a beam of light would be like? First, the story would be ordinary but the course of events extraordinary; second, its hero would be a photographer, a guardian of light; third, naturally it would be full of shadow. So who was František Drtikol? A dandy from a small mining town, a worldfamous photographer whose business went bankrupt, a master of the nude who never had much luck with women, a mystic and a Buddhist who believed in communism; a man whose many contradictions showed outwardly and were synthesized inwardly. The conception of Jan Němec's extensive novel is very unusual for contemporary

Then they go their separate ways. Lola is sweet sixteen, but she doesn't feel very sweet. Marta has the feeling that her life will end when her flirting days are over. Both suffer by the absence of someone who has disappeared from their lives, whom they are still waiting for. Esterházy! ¶ In the hotel where Marta works a funeral party is in preparation. The kitchen smells of frying garlic bread. In the honeymoon suite an Indian bride is going crazy and mixing fried eggs with orange juice... Will we have gathered enough clues by evening to allow us to reconstruct the disappearance of the missing person? And who the heck was Esterházy?



Jan Folný Little Queers / Buzíčci



These days a man kissing a man or two women walking hand in hand are sights that give about as much offence as someone wearing socks with sandals. Which is all well and good. Writers don't have to be proactive in showing that gays and lesbians are 'the same as other people', nor is there any need for ostentation in their depiction of various 'deviations'. In short, the mere fact of homosexuality no longer serves as the basis of a story. ¶ In the collection of short stories Little Queers Jan Folný shows that he is well aware of this. The volume's title – poised as it is between irony and compassion – is indicative of the author's attitude to his 'heroes'. The characters paraded in these interrelated stories include a frustrated family man who meets a young Vietnamese in a gay bar,

a famous singer who misses his class reunion, a professional footballer in love, and an elderly man preparing to move to a rest home. Folný is able to switch convincingly between genres and narrative styles, thus proving that in the Czech Republic this theme has at last moved out of the ghetto and become literature worthy of the description.

Petra Dvořáková Julie and Words / Julie mezi slovy



Ten-year-old Julie doesn't have things easy. She (like many other children) has recently lived through the divorce of her parents; together with her younger sister she is trying to get used to her father's new partner and her children. • The situation is further complicated by the fact the disintegration of the original family unit is accompanied by a move from Prague, an environment of shopping malls, selectiveentry schools and other amenities of urban life, to an ordinary village where her fellow pupils at the small school have little idea about anything. Against the background of little Julie's story the reader is acquainted with a veritable dictionary of terms from the adult world that often and inadvertently penetrate the world of children and may well be a source of worry as well as


humour. ¶ The child reader encounters interpretations of words including 'divorce', 'sex' and 'cyberbullying' and terms such as 'disability', 'dental hygiene' and 'credit card'. Young Julie herself inducts us also into a world of words that are strictly forbidden to children. By playful, gentle means Julie urges the reader to reflect on the meaning and use of words. ¶ Julie and Words touches on themes (e.g., divorce of parents, family breakdown, the forming of wider emotional ties to include parents' new partners and their children) that are frequent in children's literature but rarely fully grasped. It helps readers to come to terms with one of childhood's most painful experiences. ¶ The book is illustrated by a leading Slovak artist.

Michal Sýkora Blue Shadows / Modré stíny



One November morning a cleaning lady finds Assoc. Prof. Ondřej Chalupa dead in his study. He has been shot. Is there a connection between the murder and long-running efforts to dismiss the university's bursar for strange machinations concerning the renovation of a historical university building? Why did the murderer take the risk of shooting in the building? Who serves to gain from the death of a peculiar but honourable academic? ¶ The novel's protagonists are Olomouc police commissioner Marie Výrová and her younger colleagues Pavel Edelweiss and Kristýna Horová. The leads in an investigation that at first appears to be a common-or-garden case of embezzlement at local level gradually pulls the heroes and villains into a quagmire of unscrupulous opportunism, cronyism and corruption

that reaches to the highest echelons of politics. In the end shadows in the human mind and hidden stories from the past almost break up the team of investigators. How will the likeable and sanguine, albeit rather ordinary Commissioner Výrová tackle the situation? ¶ Sýkora's detective novels operate on multiple levels. They respect the most fundamental rules of the game — they are thrilling, entertaining, and they keep the reader guessing the identity of the killer to the very last moment. The author's ability to bring together tension, love-related entanglements and humour makes *Blue Shadows* a novel which will please even those who are not usually drawn to the thriller.

Alena Mornštajnová Blind Map / Slepá mapa



Anna, Alžběta, Anežka. Three women, three generations, one family and many twists of fate, traumas and secrets.

The story begins before the First World War, when Anna, the narrator's grandmother, leaves home with her intended Antonín for a town in the borderlands of northern Bohemia, in the face of opposition from her parents. It is as though the first letter of their names is an expression of the hope that they will start a new life there. At the same time the name symbolizes what we cannot choose for ourselves — a given family legacy that we bear always, in spite of our best efforts to change it. And also fate, whose tests we can do little to influence. • A new beginning suddenly turns into a battle for survival when Antonín is injured at the front and Anna is stricken by tuberculosis. A quarter-

century later there is a new beginning for their daughter Alžběta, who is forced to flee from the German army as it occupies the borderlands. And after half a century the hand of fate — this time in the form of an officer of the secret police — reaches for Anežka, the narrator. ¶ The dramatic tension in the lives of three women determined to start anew, their powerlessness in the face of history, their own 'genetic code' and fate — all this the narrator recounts with understanding, a provocative detachment and a sense of self-deprecation. It is in this light that we might understand the novel's last sentence: "Now it's up to me …" ¶ Without doubt Alena Mornštajnová has succeeded in writing a spellbinding novel that works on many levels. It follows not only the lives of its three heroines but those of many other characters, too. It would seem that this novel will be a revelation comparable with *All This Belongs to Me* by Petra Hůlová, now a Czech writer of international renown.

The story of four neighbours whose search for a seemingly simple way of life leads them to a commit a crime.

This novel takes the reader to the outskirts of a city and a dilapidated house in the middle of an erstwhile factory site, surrounded by the high furnaces of Vítkovice Ironworks. The run-down, rusting and crumbling production halls are reflected in the difficult lives of the people who live in the house. ¶ The protagonists all have in common a past spent in a factory cage, an inability to change their lives for the better and an inability to imagine themselves architects of their own destiny. Together they vegetate behind the concrete-panel walls, out of sight of other people and beyond the interest of the authorities. Their silent watching makes them witnesses to,


and eventually participants in a crime. Anyone who wishes to tear them away from the comfort of their order becomes a threat to them. And to remove an inconvenient person is a simple matter...

The Geography of Loss / Geografie ztráty

In 1987 a package arrives in the Mahler household. It is the last in a long line of packages that the family have received from West Germany since the end of the Forties, sent by Klára Rissmann to her son Konrad. But none of the Mahlers have ever spoken of Grandma Klára, and when Konrad dies many questions remain unanswered. Klára's granddaughter takes it upon herself to find her grandmother in order to reach an understanding of her family's past and uncover its traumas. Jakuba Katalpa's new novel takes us to the Hinterbergen of the first half of the 20th century and a middleclass family enduring hardships caused by the First and then the Second World War and afflicted by human passions and weaknesses.

In the early Forties the young adult Klára finds herself in a small village in the Sudetenland, where she comes up against the mistrust and prejudices of local people. \P The world of the main heroine, initially so promising, straightforward and carefree, takes knock after knock. Rose-tinted glasses are replaced by disillusionment. The reader is confronted with a question: After so many years, is it really possible to get at the truth? \P The author's fine language is in stark contrast with the coarse depiction of milestones in the lives of those close to Klára, making the theme of loss — which dominates the novel in many variations — more conspicuous still.

Kobold (A Surfeit of Tenderness and A Surfeit of People) is two novels in one. ¶ Two stories in one book as two elements — water and a fire that recasts what we see. Or two streams that come together as one. It is a book about the forms assumed by unconquerable love and sophisticated violence; about how human existence is pre-determined by the family into which one is born; about the ideology in which we steep ourselves; about a society whose decay spreads from the inside out, to the edges, to the 'weaker', to the sensitive. The sufferings of its characters are sicknesses of our time. And it seems that Kobolds are a source of these sufferings.

Second, extended edition of a book by a leading Czech graphic artist and commentator • This book, which addresses the process of book creation from the perspective of the book designer — is a contribution to a practically non-existent 'genre'. It contains essays on reading, bibliophily, the book and libraries and serves as a useful guide to book design for fiction, poetry and specialist literature. Its chapters deal with factors that books designed by professionals usually conceal from the reader. The author considers legibility, composition, the combining of text and illustration, choice of materials and small details of the typographer's craft that have a substantial influence on how a text is perceived. This second edition has ninety pages of new content, including an extensive section on diacritics, an anatomy of fonts and a glossary. Part of the book was


