Host focuses primarily on high-quality contemporary Czech prose and on prose in translation, as well as on thrillers, children's literature, poetry, non-fiction and specialist literature.

The roots and interests of Brno-based Host Publishers are linked with the **magazine** of the same name, which first appeared, in *samizdat*, in 1985. On the Czech book market Host now has the profile of a practically unique phenomenon. This is thanks to its well-established editorial series, authors whose names are among the most prestigious and successful in Czech literature and the Host monthly magazine, which reflects on and enriches the Czech literary scene.

Host has introduced to Czech readers the crime novels of Stieg Larsson, Lars Kepler, Jussi Adler-Olsen, Peter May, Henning Mankell and Åsa Larsson, which have been quick to occupy the top of the sales charts. Books by Czech authors Kateřina Tučková, Petra Soukupová and Jan Balabán have also become bestsellers. And the poems of legend of the underground J. H. Krchovský continue to be a popular phenomenon. But Host can take pride in more than just its leading role in the sales charts. The content of its catalogue of publications is of remarkably high quality and includes many leading writers from abroad, including Pulitzer Prize winner Jeffrey Eugenides (USA), Daniel Glattauer (Austria), Carol Birch (UK), Olga Tokarczuk (Poland), Muriel Barbery (France), Willem Frederik Hermans (Netherlands) and Czech writers including Antonín Bajaja, Radka Denemarková, Jiří Hájíček, Jakuba Katalpa and Jan Němec. The many Czech poets who publish with Host include Petr Hruška and Radek Malý. Host provides opportunities for début authors, too, be they poets, prose writers or scholars of literature.

Host recently provided a home for the prestigious Czech Library / Česká knižnice series of high-quality editions of classic Czech works. Since 2009 Host has published annually a volume entitled The Best Czech Poetry / Nejlepší české básně. Host Publishers also holds regular literary events.

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### Radka Denemarková A Contribution to the History of Joy / Příspěvek k dějinám radosti



The fourth novel by one of the most translated and highly regarded Czech women writers today.

An elderly rich man has apparently committed suicide, although the police have their doubts about the cause of this strange death. In the course of his tireless search for the true reasons behind it, a perceptive Policeman is led to a mysterious house near Prague's Petřín hill. Mysteries and motives mount up, as do hours spent with the young Widow. The main characters are three, perhaps four women — educated, bold and devoted to a higher justice by which the original duality of victim and perpetrator is lost. We are haunted by a burning question: How much more violence and war must there be before the misery at last makes us


human? This grotesque novel rolls down like lava but also speaks of the need to touch, as "the body doesn't lie and its memory doesn't deceive". Chattering swallows play a major role in the novel; for these free, migratory creatures kindness is mightier than rulers' laws.

# Jiří Hájíček Memories of a Village Dance / Vzpomínky na jednu vesnickou tancovačku



Following the success of his novels *Rustic Baroque* and *Fish Blood*, Jiří Hájíček returns with a collection of short stories.

Written between 1995 and 2014, these twenty stories are set in rural South Bohemia. The reader encounters everyday minidramas, episodes that mark the canvas of great events of history or that merely capture a mood, and the dominant feelings and experiences of peculiar as well as seemingly ordinary individuals. Hájíček evokes vividly the atmosphere of a landscape as we join the characters in wading through fallen leaves, fingering the stalks of flowering grasses, turning our face to the sun and braving the cold in a shabby overcoat. Tales of Christmas and legends of the village football team have

a special place here. The author makes no attempt to disguise the odour of the region; indeed, he exploits it to spice up and peculiarize his universal human stories. ¶ The main attributes of Hájíček's writing are as follows: unpretentiousness in terms of style, heroes and the stories themselves, intimate knowledge of a rural environment, depiction of atmosphere. For this author the return to realism and straightforward narration is not a choice but a matter of course arising out of his themes and the very substance of his prose. ¶ The short-story collection *Memories of a Village Dance* completes the picture of Jiří Hájíček as a novelist of provincial life, and as such it is a fine addition to the body of prose he has produced.

### Petra Soukupová Bertie and the Snuffler / Bertík a čmuchadlo



This first children's book by one of the most remarkable writers in Czech today is an original, extraordinarily authentic story about finding an inner balance.

"The holidays have started. I'm on the way to Richard's cottage with him and Mum. I don't want to go. I'd rather stay with Dad. Then I'd be able to play computer games all day, drink Fanta and eat chips and other stuff I like." ¶ Bertie is nine. His parents are divorced and he lives with his mum. Mum has found a new boyfriend, who Bertie calls a funny name. Bertie is struggling to deal with the changes in his life. It feels like a betrayal. He wants things to go back to how they were before. He's jealous. He's angry. He behaves badly towards everyone around him. He does things out of spite.


Then in the holidays he encounters a talking creature called a snuffler and his view of the world changes for the better... ¶ Thanks to the snuffler Bertie discovers that relationships between people are not as simple as he would like them to be; he also realizes that everything important for his life is still in it. Having come to terms with the existence of Richard and made friends with the snuffler, maybe he'll make other friends, too.

### Vendula Borůvková Annie and the Berleps / Annie a berlepsové



A heart-warming adventure tale about a journey from the Malaysian jungle to olden-days Tibet and back again.

Thirteen-year-old Annie travels to Singapore to be with her mother, a theoretical physicist. She is really looking forward to being with her mother, with whom she stayed when her parents split up three years ago. They travel together into the interior of Malaysia. They are joined on their expedition by a Czech doctor of medicine called Karel, who claims that he, too, is here to work. But Karel is really an alien! ¶ Mum is on her way to the jungle when she loses a talisman that Annie was given by her dad. The girl sets out on a peculiar rescue mission on which she encounters the Berleps, a mysterious nation of dogs, and has

incredible adventures that lead her to a place she has always dreamed of and which was visited by her father before he left them. This place is Tibet. But it's the Tibet of a few centuries ago... ¶ And perhaps this place holds the key to the future for all of them.

### Jiří Šimáček A Small Night-Time Feast / Malá noční žranice



Like Šimáček's previous books, A Small Night-Time Feast is set in today's Brno. It tells the story of an ageing widower who is unable to come to terms with the lives of his children: a middle-aged son who doesn't work and doggedly refuses to grow up and a daughter who lives with a man he can't stand. Hence their co-existence in one house is the cause of a great deal of conflict and misunderstanding. At first sight Šimáček's prose is based not around major twists of plot but banal happenings in the family; for the individuals involved, however, the intensity of these family dramas and traumas makes them of crucial importance. The monologues of 'untrustworthy' narrators, which are ironic verging on bizarre, tell the story from a limited perspective and ultimately leave


it up to the reader to figure out and compose the true sequence of events.

### Matěj Hořava Distilled Spirit (Stories from the Banat) / Pálenka (Prózy z Banátu)



A young Czech teacher comes to teach local children to read and write. They teach him how to light a corn stove. Stray dogs, trampled mulberries, goldenrod in bloom, the distant roar of the Danube. And gradually the memories come, as though things were happening all over again: a childhood devoted to competitive gymnastics, treading the boards, studying in Germany, the solitude of different shores and journeys. People's faces, fleeting moments of closeness. ¶ Young author Matěj Hořava has come up with a meditative work that is deeply autobiographical and stylistically distinctive. Its short, dense, linguistically colourful chapters are built around important events and seemingly fleeting feelings that for some reason are remembered for a lifetime: light at a certain

angle of refraction, the sight of woman who will or will not be his, a howling wolf on a hillside. A special time of youth and a peculiar existence unfold before the reader's eyes.


Although the book is composed of fragmentary texts, it is as though the motifs of closeness with women, journey and escape and settling accounts with childhood form a single entity, perhaps the author's animus. These core themes are developed in spirals as the author adds memories and experiences gradually and his writing goes deeper. Hořava's ability to find tiny knots where fibres meet in the fabric of time is rare indeed.

### Jakub Dotlačil The Other Lives of Hynek Harr / Jiné životy Hynka Harra



The 1860s. Czech society is coming to life and claiming its place in the Monarchy. The first Czech associations are founded, some of which still exist today. Many more will not be so fortunate; The Other Lives of Hynek Harr tells the story of one of them — the first Czech association of parapsychology, whose members sought to lay scientific foundations for the study of telepathy and spiritualism before most scientists concluded that telepathy and spiritualism had no scientific foundations. This novel brings together the real world of the 19th century with a vision of the world asserted by the theories of parapsychology. Out of this comes a fabulous story about tolerance and national and human identity. But most of all it is the story of Hynek Harr, a young teacher of mathematics who one Sunday

attends a meeting of Czech parapsychologists and so sets in motion a chain of events that change his life completely. A gifted medium, he travels to Berlin and becomes involved in the Austro-Prussian War, only to discover that things are not all that they seem.

## Martina Boučková The Mystery of Grandpa's Diary / Tajemství dědečkova deníku



All kinds of things can happen when the start of the holidays doesn't go according to plan. How will Charlie get on in an unfamiliar environment? And what was his sailor grandfather really like?

Holidays with Grandma in Přelouč turn into an unforgettable adventure after Grandma is taken to hospital in an ambulance and Charlie suddenly has to fend for himself. Like a true adventurer, he immediately embarks on a quest to find his grandfather. Charlie knows that Grandpa was a sailor, but he suspects that there is more to this than meets the eye. Could Grandpa be descended from pirates, or even water sprites? ¶ In the country Charlie makes two new friends who show him a different kind of life. He sleeps on a straw mattress

and rides a horse, things that are normal for some but great adventures for a boy from a Prague housing estate. Then Charlie joins his friends in the hunt for a giant mythical snake that lives at the bottom of an abandoned pool! • When Grandma comes back from hospital, Charlie gets an amazing present from her — Grandpa's diary. Then things really start to happen! By reading the diary Charlie is transported to the Toothy Dragon, Grandpa's ship that rides the waves of the North Sea...

### Kateřina Tučková The Žítková Goddesses / Žítkovské bohyně



A fascinating tale of the female soul, magic and a part of Czech history kept hidden.

High in the hills of the White Carpathians there lived women with extraordinary gifts, healers who from time immemorial had treated all kinds of affliction and coped with all kinds of difficulty; it was also said that they could see the future. Known as goddesses, they passed their arts from generation to generation. One of the last in the line of goddesses of Žítková, Dora Idesová has not learned these arts. She is a graduate in ethnology and has chosen to write an extensive academic study about the goddesses. In the late 1990s she visits the archives of the Ministry of the Interior in Pardubice, where she discovers a State Security Police file on an enemy of

the state — the goddess Surmena, her aunt. Although Dora never became a goddess herself, as she unravels the life stories of the women of Žítková she is surprised to learn that she is an inseparable part of an arcane lore...



### Jiří Hájíček Fish Blood / Rybí krev



The author continues his exploration of the Czech village that we last saw in the prizewinning *Rustic Baroque*.

We find ourselves in southern Bohemia as the 1980s give way to the 1990s. After fifteen years abroad Hana returns in 2008 to a half-flooded village on the banks of the Vltava. Here she grew up. Here she wished to marry and become a teacher at the one-class school. But everything turned out differently. Now she stands alone on the deserted village square. Hana has the courage to look back, to put questions to herself and those who once meant a great deal to her. People over forty wish to put their affairs in order, to draw a line under old issues and sources of pain — this is what Hana tells herself as she meets her father, brother and childhood

friends after many years apart from them. ¶ The novel is first and foremost about the disintegration of a family and a village in a completely different set of social circumstances. The theme of the displacement and demolition of a community so that a nuclear power station can take its place is certainly a topical one that needs to be addressed at a time when the future of other villages is under threat—at any place in the world really. ¶ But Fish Blood is not any old 'green novel'; above all it is an absorbing human story of three friends from a small village whom fate has scattered across the world. It is a story with strong echoes of longing for family cohesion, and it is about the power of love and forgiveness.



### Jan Němec A History of Light / Dějiny světla



A novel about the photographer František Drtikol.

Have you ever wondered what a story written by a beam of light would be like? First, the story would be ordinary but the course of events extraordinary; second, its hero would be a photographer, a guardian of light; third, naturally it would be full of shadow. ¶ So who was František Drtikol? A dandy from a small mining town, a world-famous photographer whose business went bankrupt, a master of the nude who never had much luck with women, a mystic and a Buddhist who believed in communism; a man whose many contradictions showed outwardly and were synthesized inwardly. ¶ The conception of Jan Němec's extensive novel is very unusual

for contemporary Czech prose — fresco-like, it is an artistic and spiritual Bildungsroman that covers over half a century, bringing to life the silver mines of Příbram, Jugendstil Munich and First Republic Bohemianism, with naked models wandering along the lines and light merging unobserved with knowledge...



### Jakuba Katalpa Germans / Němci

A Geography of Loss / Geografie ztráty



In 1987 a package arrives in the Mahler household. It is the last in a long line of packages that the family have received from West Germany since the end of the Forties, sent by Klára Rissmann to her son Konrad. But none of the Mahlers have ever spoken of Grandma Klára, and when Konrad dies many questions remain unanswered. Klára's granddaughter takes it upon herself to find her grandmother in order to reach an understanding of her family's past and uncover its traumas. Jakuba Katalpa's novel takes us to the Hinterbergen of the first half of the 20th century and a middle-class family enduring hardships caused by the First and then the Second World War and afflicted by human passions and weaknesses. In the early Forties the young adult Klára finds herself in a small village in the Sudetenland, where she comes up against the mistrust and prejudices

of local people.  $\P$  The world of the main heroine, initially so promising, straightforward and carefree, takes knock after knock. Rose-tinted glasses are replaced by disillusionment. The reader is confronted with a question: After so many years, is it really possible to get at the truth?  $\P$  The author's fine language is in stark contrast with the coarse depiction of milestones in the lives of those close to Klára, making the theme of loss — which dominates the novel in many variations — more conspicuous still.

### Petra Dvořáková Julie and Words / Julie mezi slovy



Ten-year-old Julie doesn't have things easy. She (like many other children) has recently lived through the divorce of her parents; together with her younger sister she is trying to get used to her father's new partner and her children. • The situation is further complicated by the fact that the disintegration of the original family unit is accompanied by a move from Prague, an environment of shopping malls, selectiveentry schools and other amenities of urban life, to an ordinary village where her fellow pupils at the small school have little idea about anything. Against the background of little Julie's story the reader is acquainted with a veritable dictionary of terms from the adult world that often and inadvertently penetrate the world of children and may well be a source of worry as well as

humour. ¶ The child reader encounters interpretations of words including 'divorce', 'sex' and 'cyberbullying' and terms such as 'disability', 'dental hygiene' and 'credit card'. Young Julie herself inducts us into a world of words that are strictly forbidden to children. By playful, gentle means Julie urges the reader to reflect on the meaning and use of words. ¶ Julie and Words touches on themes (e.g., divorce of parents, family breakdown, the forming of wider emotional ties to include parents' new partners and their children) that are frequent in children's literature but rarely fully grasped. It helps readers to come to terms with one of childhood's most painful experiences. ¶ The book is illustrated by a leading Slovak artist.
